MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Organization Resiliency - A Snapshot.

With one year under my belt and the pandemic still grappling our communities, it was time to roll up my sleeves and work harder than I ever have to ensure ANCC made it through the pandemic successfully.

The road was difficult to navigate at times, however, with a dedicated and inspired staff, we continued to come to the table unafraid of asking the hard questions and doing things creatively.

You see, community development without community interaction is pretty hard to accomplish. We continually reimagined and adapted our approaches to ensure we delivered programs and events our community was inspired by.

Most notably, we were able to safely offer in-person summer camp in 2021 and we commenced new partnerships with the Cowan Foundation, the Professional Resource Centre at Conestoga College, and Nutrition for Learning.



Our summer camp boasted 32 participants per week with each week offering STEAM education opportunities where children explored various applications of science, technology, engineering, arts, and math.

We also engaged in a new partnership with the Cambridge Self-Help Foodbank where they delivered weekly snacks for our camp participants and additional programs.



MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR CONTINUED...


This was a very integral partnership as the pandemic continued to shine a light on the socioeconomic challenges our families faced among challenges of job loss and increased food costs across the country.

In September, we hosted our very first charity run, the "ANCC Graffiti Run", inspired by the popular Colour Run. This was a great initiative that got new people involved with our organization and provided fundraising for our various recreation programs.

This was such an inspiring event where people of all ages came together for one great cause. In the future, we hope to offer the "ANCC Graffiti Run" for the purpose of fundraising for our Breakfast Club and we look forward to engaging with new sponsors and community members.

Throughout the fall and summer with the support of two staff members, we conducted an organizational SWOT analysis on our Inclusion, Diversity, Equity and Accessibility (IDEA) policies as they pertained to our website, HR policies, and training.

Our team identified opportunities for our organization to adopt best practices and successfully presented these opportunities to our staff and Board of Directors.



The team also conducted 3 successful IDEA training workshops for our summer camp staff, fall recreation staff, and Board of Directors. Each training was refreshing, insightful, and inspiring. Our hope is to further develop these policies and proceed with implementation to ensure our organization has IDEA embedded in our practices and organizational culture.

As a member of the Cambridge Neighbourhood Organizations (CNO) I continued to contribute to our project "Our Sustainable Network" in the area of Operational Foundations, where I use my background in project management and administration to identify duplication, implement shared systems and support change management. Our purpose is to increase efficiencies in our individual organizations so that more time is spent in community development.






With limitations to our drop-in programs, we stayed engaged with our youth ages 12-18 demographic through a variety of new and adapted in-person and virtual programs.



