

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

Dear Alison Neighborhood Community Centre members and stakeholders,

As we look ahead to 2026, I've spent a lot of time reflecting on the changes we've experienced and the strength that continues to hold this community together. Like many organizations, ANCC has had its share of trials and tribulations. There have been moments that tested us, required adjustment, and asked us to stay focused on what matters most. Through it all, what has never changed is the role this centre plays in the neighbourhood and the people who show up every day to make it a place of care, safety, and connection.

MINUTES

1. Carlos Roque welcomed everyone to the meeting. Great turnout!

2. Acceptance of the minutes of the 2024 AGM minutes: Minutes were reviewed by those present. Motion to accept the minutes by Carlos. Seconded by Karen. Motioned carried.

3. Presentation of Audit: Noah Jensen reviewed the audit report. He notes the reduction in staffing costs and the smaller deficit from the 2022-2023 year. Eric motioned to accept the report. Karen seconded. Motion carried.

4. Carlos asked if there were any concerns with using Racolta Jensen (R.J.) for the following year. There were no concerns. Carlos motioned to use R.J. again. Karen seconded. Motion passed.

5. Financial Management Review Outcomes: Kim Fowler presented an overview of some financial changes over the past year. Kudos to Eddy and Jamie for making the centre viable considering the financial situation over the past year. For example, they decreased overall staff numbers, increased registrants for summer camp and put themselves into programs. By August 2025 the deficit of \$80k will be in a surplus.

6. Presentation and Approval of Budget: Jamie Hatfield presented the budget for the upcoming year. There were no concerns from members.

*Special note that ANCC has received a generous donation from an anonymous donor for breakfast club that is covering the cost of breakfast program foods. Breakfast program will be run out of the main centre at St. Anne school beginning in September 2025. Carlos motioned to have the 2025 budget approved. Nancy seconded and motion was carried.

7. Recreation Manager Report: Jamie Hatfield gave an overview of the recreation programming from the past year. Some highlights included:

- new program for grade 5/6 called SPARK to help develop leadership skills; it was a great success
- there has been an increase in volunteers
- new trip this year "Youth Corn Maze" was also a great success

Staff are looking forward for another great year to come. Winter programs are starting shortly and then summer camp planning and organizing.

8. Slate of Nominees: There have been 2 people volunteering with the organization over the past year and have expressed interest in joining the Board of Directors. Nancy Fernandes and Nicol Payne introduced themselves to the group. They have been previously interviewed and vetted prior to the AGM. Eric motioned to vote them both in as board members. Karen seconded and motion was carried.

9. Closing Comments: Carlos thanked everyone for coming and referred to several key items in his AGM Chair message. Special shout out to Kim for her extra work in helping ANCC thrive through a very difficult time. Her leadership is/was greatly appreciated. Carlos motioned to close the meeting. Nicol seconded. Motion carried.

BUDGET 2025-2026

Alison Neighbourhood receives funding from a variety of sources, including year-to-year grants, one-time grants, and fees for service. Grants make up almost three quarters of Alison Neighbourhood's income. A breakdown of these income sources is listed on the budget on the following page.

Because the budget was passed in principle by the board in November, there have been additional funding opportunities that have arisen since then. Should more opportunities arise, the funds would be expensed within the current financial year and sit outside the current budget, but under the governance of the Board of Directors.


